Unit 5 - Legislation, policies and procedures

Knowledge: Recall key facts on the early years settings, how they are regulated and standardised. The learner will know what regulation means and the name of the regulatory authority.

Unit 6 - Expectations of a EYP

Knowledge: Recognise the expectations with regards to appearance, behaviour, timekeeping and attitude when working in an early years setting.

Unit 7 - Roles and responsibilities within the EY settings

Knowledge: The roles and responsibilities of those working with children from birth to 5 years in early years settings and the purpose of partnership working within early years provision.

Unit 8 - Importance of observations in early years childcare

You will learn about the organisations that provide services in this sector, and the different settings in which these services are delivered according to the needs of the service user.
