About His Person: a list of objects which reveal a disturbing secret about a character	WHAT – HOW - WHY	
Island Man: a Caribbean man reveals his thoughts on moving to London	WHAT	WHAT is the writer's purpose? In other words what do they wish to show the reader? (Make a clear point in response to the task/question.)
Search for my Tongue: the speakers thoughts on losing their cultural identity		
Hunchback in the Park: the story of an isolated man and the cruelty he faces.	HOW	HOW is the writer showing us what they want to show us? Use examples from the text. (Evidence can be either detailed close references or carefully selected quotations.)
Havisham: a monologue by Miss Havisham revealing her feelings at being jilted.		
Hitcher: A seemingly random act of violence from the point of view of the attacker.	WHY	WHY has the writer done what they have done? Are they trying to explore a big idea? Explaining "why" the writer has included this quote and point (using inference) ...which suggests...
Education for Leisure: the inner life of a disturbed teenager.		
Wife of Bath: the Wife's insights into love, marriage and men.	WHY	Explaining "why" continued: unpicking the writer's choice of language or use of structural devices and what impact they have on the reader

Extended metaphor: a metaphor that is developed throughout a poem	Stanza: a verse in poetry	
Simile: a comparison of two things using like or as	Inference: hidden meanings which are identified by reading the clues.	
Alliteration: repeated sounds at the beginning of closely connected words	Juxtaposition: two contrasting ideas placed near each other for effect	
Personification: giving human characteristics to something non-human	Dramatic monologue: a poem in the form of a speech by one person	
Symbolism: an object is used to represent a bigger idea or theme	Perspective: a point of view or way of looking at something	
Plosives: repeated 'p' and 'b' sounds	Semantic Field: a group of words which are connected by an idea or theme
